SAFETY WORKSHOP

The Missouri State Library will hold a workshop entitled "Safety in the Library" on Thursday, March 25, 1993 from 10:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. (with a break for lunch) at the Ferguson Municipal Public Library, 108 Church Street in Ferguson, Missouri. Topics will include fire safety, as well as general workplace conditions for public and staff safety. Is your library safe? If how safe? How good are your fire so, extinguishers? Have you accounted for the perils of fire? Flood? Personal injury? Are your fire exits cluttered? What happens when severe illness or injury (either to staff or patron) occurs in your library? Whom do you contact for emergency assistance? How can those providers help you before an emergency happens? Answers to these and other questions will be provided at the workshop. There will be no fee charged to attend this workshop. Information from the Occupational Safety and Health Agency (OSHA), the Missouri Department of Labor, and the American Red Cross, among others, will be available at the workshop. Poet Nikki Giovanni to Speak at Central Library

ationally known poet, writer and activist Nikki Giovanni will present a lecture program on Sunday. Feb. 28. from 2 to 3 p.m. in the Great Hall of Central Library. This event, the keynote address in this year's Black History Month celebration, is free of charge and open to the public.

Ms. Giovanni has been called a "revolutionary poet," having fought for civil rights and equality in education. Her voice is tempered with humor and sensitivity, and she has established herself as a popular literary figure. In her lectures, she talks about her life, about poetry and about



applying creativity to everything we do. "Do something with your life!" Ms. Giovanni recently told a college audience. "You will find that what you have coveted is not worth coveting...There is a limit to what material things can do."

Ms. Giovanni graduated from Fisk University in 1967 and soon earned a reputation for outspokenness both in her writing and in person. After the publication in 1968 of her first book of poetry, *Black Feeling, Black Talk*, she was nicknamed "the princess of

to

black poetry," a title she proudly retains today.

Ms. Giovanni has published a total of nearly 20 books. Some of her best-known works are *Black Judgment: Night Comes Softly; Gemini; Sing a Soft Black Song; My House; Ego Tripping and Other Poems for Young Readers; The Women and the Men; Cotton Candy On a Rainy Day; Those Who Ride the Night Winds; and Sacred Cows...And Other Edibles.*

She also has made several records, including "Truth Is On Its Way;" "Like a Ripple On a Pond;" "The Way I Feel;" "Legacies:" "The Reason I Like Chocolate;" and "Cotton Candy On a Rainy Day."

Professor Hacker's *Two Nations: Black and White, Separate, Hostile, Unequal* is the first comprehensive study of racism since Gunnar Myrdal's 1944 *An American Dilemma.* He asserts that no other minority group has made so unavailing a struggle for acceptance, and that the misconception of African-American inferiority rests at the root of the problem. 
