DOWNLINKS FOR EXCELLENCE - FACT SHEET

What is Downlinks for Excellence?

Downlinks for Excellence is a satellite-delivered continuing education project for librarians and others serving youth in public libraries and schools in Missouri and throughout the nation. It is free to participants, funded through a grant from the U.S. Department of Education, and designed by a project team working from the School of Library and Informational Science at the University of Missouri-Columbia. The objective of the project is to create and inform learning communities of adults who have a strong interest in helping young people learn, including librarians, teachers, board members, parents, care providers, and many others.

Downlinks for Excellence consists of five two-hour telecasts on Saturdays featuring national experts discussing the following topics:

--new understandings about how children learn (November 19),

--how the global village can become part of learning even in the smallest community (January 14),

--the implications of multimedia and telecommunications technologies for learning in communities (February 11, March 25), and

-leadership issues in services to youth (April 22).

Structured activities will precede and follow the telecast at seven Missouri sites (Cape Girardeau, Columbia, Kirksville, Kansas City, Rolla, St. Louis, and Springfield). Participants in other group sites will be strongly encouraged to use these opportunities to organize their own panel discussions, do work in small groups, and generally explore further how the telecast relates to their communities and regions. A site facilitator workbook suggesting such activities will be provided for every group site in the state, along with materials for individual participants. Master copies of these materials will be provided to out-of-state conveners.

Who can participate?

Literally anyone can participate. Individuals with access to a steerable satellite dish can downlink the programs from their homes. Groups may meet in county extension offices, school districts, and educational institutions throughout Missouri and in any state where satellite dishes and technical support are available for downlinking. There is no downlinking fee. Seven official project sites in Missouri will offer wraparound activities before and after the broadcast and trained facilitators to assist participant interaction. The project also includes a special provision for 75 people to earn one hour of graduate or undergraduate credit by participating in all five sessions at one of the official Missouri project sites. Membership in this group is by scholarship application only. You may obtain an application for participating in this credit group by calling (314) 882-9543.

When and where will participants meet?

Participants in the seven official Missouri sites will begin at 9 a.m. on project downlink days. The broadcast will take place between 10 a.m. and noon (CDT) and participants will finish their work by 1 p.m. Other sites in Missouri may set different meeting times around the broadcast times. Participants in other states will adjust their times to Central Daylight Time. It also will be possible to tape the broadcasts and use them for sessions you may organize at a different time.

What can I do now?

--Get on the project mailing list (send your name, etc. to the address below)

--Talk with the advisory committee members (listed below) about your interests

--Contact and work with your professional association, your state library, or your regional library system or consortium to use this opportunity as a springboard for discussion in your area.

--Apply for a scholarship to use Downlinks for credit; encourage someone else to do so.

--Pass this information along to colleagues who are interested in this topic.

--Host a "Downlinks" session in your community; ask for a site facilitator's handbook.

Where did this idea originate and who is working on it?

Needs assessments of library employees in Missouri undertaken by the School of Library and Informational Science indicated that money, time, and distance/isolation are the three primary barriers to participation in continuing education. The initiation of local, state, and regional planning for implementation of new technologies in Missouri schools and communities and state and national commitment to educational goals for the year 2000 suggest strongly that adults working with youth face important new challenges and opportunities over the next few years. New methods for reaching these adults seemed absolutely necessary.

SLIS faculty members Dale Guthrie and Diane Tobin Johnson are working with an advisory committee which includes Connie Bush (Daniel Boone Regional Library, Columbia); Susan Cole (Dept. of Elementary and Secondary Education, Jefferson City); Joe Donaldson (Higher and Adult Education, MU); Vera Florea (Springfield-Greene County Library); Curt Fuchs (Columbia Public Schools); Leslie Edmonds Holt (St. Louis Public Library); Rita Linck (president, Missouri Association of School Librarians); Bob McGlasson (Southwest Baptist University, Bolivar); Floyd rendin (Lec's Summit High School), Barbara Reading (Missouri State Library); Anitra Steele, (Mid Continent Public Library, Independence); Marilyn Stone (Hickman High School, Columbia); Nancy Thompson (Video Communication, Academic Support Center, MU); John Wedman (Curriculum & Instruction, College of Education, MU); Gerry Westwood (Youth Programs, University Extension). This class is open only to those who apply using this scholarship application form. Tuition will be paid. If more than 75 people apply, selection will be made based on geography, current student status, size of the population served, and willingness to participate in followup activities. An attempt will be made to include participants from all areas of the state and small, rural communities. No more than 20% of the scholarships will be given to those who currently are enrolled in a degree program. Support of school and library administration will also be considered.

Applicants will be required to:

- (a) attend all five Downlinks sessions (November 19, 1994; January 14, February 11, March 25, and April 22, 1995) in a staffed Missouri site (Cape Girardeau, Columbia, Kansas City, Kirksville, Rolla, St. Louis, Springfield);
- (b) submit appropriate written work (for example: a journal, final paper, or any assigned exercises)
- (c) participate in small group discussions as appropriate;
- (d) evaluate their own progress in the course and assist in evaluating the project as a whole.

Please note: We hope that hundreds of people will be participating in this project.
